A Day Camp Just for Adults!

Spring School Tours

We could not offer school tours without our hard-working volunteer docents. Your willingness to volunteer your time with a variety of school groups is vital to our school tour program which generates income to maintain and support the Village.

But that only includes the tours that are docent-led by our volunteers. We are thrilled the "Big Lesson Plan" approach has been adopted by more local schools. What is a "Big Lesson Plan"?

That's when financial support and school commitment come together to allow students to visit the Village for multiple days. Some schools choose a 3-day program, others 4-days, and some (lucky) schools have committed to participate for a full 5-day, week-long program.

These programs require considerable planning effort on the part of the teachers as they work with their students for weeks ahead to prepare them for life in the 19th century. The teachers also work with parents (and grandparents) to teach the students in various areas that a Village docent would typically provide.

Did You Know...

...children from four counties helped fund the large bronze tablet in memory of Chief Okemos that hangs on the outside of Okemos' Central Elementary? As reported in the Lansing State Journal in 1923, the cost for the original plan for the tablet exceeded the ability of the committee to raise adequate funding. "Thus their plans were modified, and the tablet, which is a thing of beauty, as well as durability, was purchased instead, at a cost of between \$500 and \$600."

"The design of the tablet is neat and tasteful. In a circle near the top, is Chief Okemos' head in bold relief, and beneath it the following inscription:

'Erected to the memory of Chief Okemos of the Chippewas, whose tribe once occupied the ground upon which this school now stands.'

'Brave in battle, wise in council, honorable in peace.'

'After his people became ravaged by disease and dispersed by the incoming of the white race, he sill remained a Chief, proud that he was once the leader of brave men.' 'He died Dec. 5, 1858, and his body rests at Shim-ni-con, on Grand River, in Ionia County..."

"School children numbering over 2,000 living in the townships of Ingham, Clinton, Shiawassee, and Ionia counties, contributed their nickles toward this fund, the balance of which was raised by popular subscription."
